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KEY DEFINITIONS AND RELATED TERMS

Sustainable Development/ Sustainability:

Development that meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs. Sustainable development encompasses three dimensions: economic, environmental, and social.

Stakeholders:

BOARD STATEMENT

Perhaps the most prominent consequence of the year 2020 is widespread of the Covid-19 pandemic and the humanitarian tragedies it has caused in all countries of the world, without exception to this day. Among the salient repercussions is the worsening of economic and social crises, especially in the developing world, which was already suffering from successive humanitarian crises due to the many regional conflicts.

In Palestine, the Gaza Strip has entered its 15th year under the Israeli blockade, in which more than two million people live in inadequate social and economic conditions as the harsh reality in the Gaza Strip has been deteriorating at an alarming rate due to the Corona pandemic. The inability of patients to receive appropriate treatment, especially those with Covid-19 that has spread at an alarming rate among the population of the Gaza Strip, and due to the shortage in ventilators and other medical devices, had increased the death rate of those patients according to statistics of the Ministry of Health, as well as a leading to a severe shortage of therapeutic drugs in hospitals. Economically, this period is the worst due to the sharp rise in unemployment (45.1%), the closure of (80%) of economic facilities, the near-total suspension of exports along with an evident delay in reconstruction, and due to the stagnation by many donors in fulfilling their construction promises. All these reasons, among many others, have contributed to the escalation of the blockade and tightening the stranglehold on the population of the Gaza Strip.

Regional crises have had a devastating impact on the lives of thousands of affected people seeking a better life outside the conflict zones. Since its inception in 2014, the Gaza Destek Association has been committed to contributing to alleviating the suffering of the Palestinian people, particularly in Gaza. At its 2019 meeting, the board decided to amend its statutes to extend its work to all conflict zones around the world to alleviate global human suffering.

The successful efforts by the association and its dedication to serving those affected through relief and development programs and projects in the Gaza Strip per the directions of stakeholders are evident in the testimony and recommendation of our partners and donors, hence, providing credible evidence of the association's competence in supervising and implementing projects on scientific grounds and standards of sustainability and global transparency.

As a result, we believe the association can utilize its expertise in humanitarian work in other affected areas without compromising the quality of its work or commitment within the Gaza Strip.

We, at Gazze Destek Association, would like to extend our gratitude and appreciation to all the benefactors, donor institutions, local partners, and to our staff who have worked around the clock to bring joy to the hearts of vulnerable and marginalized groups for the aim of making a difference in these difficult situations.

ABOUT THIS REPORT

This report is the fourth voluntary sustainability report by the Gazze Destek Association, issued under the instructions of its board of directors in line with the commitment of the latter to enhance and reinforce sustainability. This is to assure an ever-growing commitment of the board of directors to the transparency and their adherence to the public disclosure about the association's performance in various aspects of sustainability whereby the assembly had adopted the application of sustainability management in its three domains: social, economic, and environmental; In addition to the association's quest for attaining an external validation for this report to enhance its quality and credibility.

The panel responsible for preparing this report has adopted a scientific methodology that is based on the harmonious integration of the international humanitarian principles and laws with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) on one side, and the national developmental goals with the Sustainable Development Goals on the other side for preparing this report. This, in turn, has expanded the list of beneficiaries from this report while encompassing all the needs of its stakeholders. The followed methodology included the measurement of sustainability, not only for the external operations of the association but also for its internal operations as well. Furthermore, the numbers and data relating to the humanitarian situation in Gaza mentioned within this report are based on "The Humanitarian Situation Report for Gaza Strip 2019" report. Also, all the financial records mentioned in this report were prepared under the accrual basis of accounting.

This report includes the standard disclosures for sustainability reporting, as "This report has been prepared per the standards of the Global Reporting Initiative (GRI: Core option); The GRI guideline table can be found in the index (1) of this report, which covers the period between January 1, 2020, till December 31, 2020.

In accordance to the recommendations of the International Forum for supporting Gaza following the Israeli aggression on the Gaza Strip in the summer of 2014, and as a result of the continued suffering of two million Palestinians living under blockade since 2006, and due to the place that the Palestinian cause occupies at the Turkish society (especially Gaza) along with the continuous support the latter presents in terms humanitarian initiatives to mitigate this crisis, a group of experts and humanitarian workers in Turkey have engaged in the foundation of Gazze Destek (GDD) in Istanbul licensed under the registration No. 43-209-183. 

As demonstrated in the financial statement of the fiscal year that ended on 31/12/2020, the total revenues for the year 2020 have reached (\$7,808,986) whereas the total expenditures have reached (\$7,808,986). In addition, the annual progress report for Gazze Destek for the year 2020 indicates that the total number of beneficiaries from the association's projects and activities had reached (1,287,231) beneficiaries. The report also indicates the implementation of (455) projects within programs and interventions by the association in the three sectors: social, economic, and environmental.







OUR HUMANITARIAN PARTNERSHIPS

The association continues to strengthen its humanitarian partnership based on its strategic approach extending from the year 2020 to the end of 2022, believing in the importance of partnerships in the development and integration of grants and humanitarian services whereby the margin of duplication of services is reduced and the impact of grants on beneficiaries are maximized. Furthermore, the association has strengthened the relationship with the private sector in a way that contributes to reducing the cost of services and improving their quality, as the association had strengthened its previous partnerships and seeking new partnerships to reach (16) partnerships with official entities, (47) partnerships with private companies, (40) partnerships with local associations, and (67) partnerships with private institutional donors that have no executive offices in the regions of the executed programs and projects.

The association's team had also sought, through its strategic partners, to acquire memberships in international networks, among which were the Health Cluster and the Shelter Cluster. In addition, the team has participated in seven conferences, forums, and events related to humanitarian work, all which are based on humanitarian development work and topics that encourage and promote the orientation towards sustainable corporate work.




GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE CHART




OUR HUMANITARIAN PARTNERSHIPS


PROMINENT HUMANITARIAN NUMBERS (FIRST QUARTER OF 2020)



A COMPARISON BETWEEN PROMINENT HUMANITARIAN NUMBERS DURING 2018,2019,2020.




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


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PRIORITIES OF STAKEHOLDERS 2020 -2021

Priorities of Stakeholders 2020

The board of directors considers the following parties as stakeholders of the association: the beneficiaries, employees, operational staff, the general assembly, and the strategic partners (from the public, private, or the civil sectors), and the financiers. The priorities of the stakeholders were determined based on external and internal environmental analyses, a study about the reality of the humanitarian situation in the Gaza Strip, the Sustainability Development Goals (SDGs), and the Palestinian National Development Goals, while also

referring to the Core Humanitarian Standard and in a coordinating and complementary framework with stakeholders. Accordingly, the primary and most urgent programs and projects for the Palestinian people in the Gaza Strip were identified and implemented per the updated humanitarian intervention plan decided by the board of directors, which

includes the most crucial areas of humanitarian intervention in the Gaza Strip for the year (2020-2021). In light of the periodic follow-up and updating of the needs of stakeholders, and due to the spreading (Covid-19) epidemic, two projects were developed among our priorities, namely, the quarantine requirements and the hygiene kit. Table (1) presents a map of the stakeholders' priorities and how Gazze Destek Association responds to them.

OUR SUSTAINABLE STRATEGIC DIRECTION

Constructing our sustainability strategy was a significant challenge as it requires prominent and deep anticipation of the future, being the first sustainable strategic plan adopted by the association covering (9) years, keeping it up to date with the Palestinian National Development Plans of 2022 so that the association could reach its ambitious vision of being among the pillars of sustainable philanthropy in Palestine, generally, and in Gaza specifically.

Indeed, the association had constructed its partnership strategy with its stakeholders by passing through the following several stages: conducting strategic analysis and keeping abreast with the environmental changes, constructing and developing the strategic direction, implementing the strategic directions through an operational action plan, working in accordance with a methodology for strategic and operational oversight.

The Gazze Destek association has determined in its strategy (until the year 2025) three major stages as illustrated in the figure below, in terms of three years per stage. Within each of the three stages, a review for the hypothesis is conducted while keeping pace with changes and implementing the necessary modification before proceeding to the following stage.



SUSTAINABILITY APPROACH



The association undertook several procedures to maximize the social impact of its operations by improving human resources and developing the implementation and operation of projects and programs.

Maximizing the Social Impact through Human Resources and Volunteering Management

- The association had committed to the global and local employment laws in its treatment of its staffs, employees, and volunteers, including no child labor and providing all required occupational health and safety factors.
- The association had invested in the voluntary efforts of distinguished university students with university scholarships for masters and doctorates programs, as there is an integrated system for them similar to the Staff Rules.
- The workers in the association have received training commensurate with their work needs in the association, at an average of 238.5 training hours.
- The association had pursued the principle of non-discrimination based on sex, race, religion, or other aspects of its system for managing employees or volunteers.

Maximizing Social Effect through Projects and Programs Management

- The association has published a systematic report about the humanitarian situation in the Gaza Strip, listing its accomplishments and its donor institutions. Furthermore, the association had prepared a list of prioritized interventions required in the Gaza strip considering the Global Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and the National Development Goals.
- The association has updated the humanitarian intervention plan based on the humanitarian situation report in the Gaza Strip and in integration with the intervention plans of the other donors. Also, the update has focused further on the developmental side, emphasizing on the interventions being environment friendly and conforming to the international and local standards of safety and health.
- The association has implemented its programs and projects following international and local health and safety standards while preserving the environment. Moreover, it has committed to providing products and services to the beneficiaries, which are compliant with the standards of the relevant ministry, while safeguarding the privacy of the beneficiaries.
- The association has been conducting periodic monitoring of each intervention regarding the number of beneficiaries out of the total number of the affected population within the scope of the intervention.

Cost Management, Directing and Improving Expenditure Efficiency


The association's administration operates in accordance with an operational plan and an accredited financial budget to attain the highest expenditure efficiency possible, whereby the administrative expenditure of the projects did not exceed (0.37%), which guarantees the highest yield for each dollar acquired by the association to achieve its purposes.

Among our prominent initiatives to improve the expenditure efficiency, is our partnership with local partners and suppliers, who can implement with high quality for lowest administrative expenses possible under transparent regulations, in addition to investing in volunteers and local laborers, and benefiting from modern technology. Thus, we hope that the impacts of these initiatives would reflect positively on lowering the general and administrative expenditures throughout the implementation of the second strategic plan, which ends in the year 2022.

Developing Our Financial Revenues

The association works on recruiting its financial incomes from accredited sources under the state laws, after which the association's revenues used to consist of the grants offered by the institution and individual donors from **20** different countries (as illustrated in the figure below), which would contribute to the financial sustainability for the association's projects.
